- Q1. (a) What, if anything, is the role of the citizen in constitutional development? (8 Marks)
  - (b) How does this role impact concerns regarding the democratic legitimacy of constitutionalism and judicial review? (7 Marks)
- Q2. If you had the power to do so, what changes, if any, would you bring to the exercise of the PIL jurisdiction by Courts? Why would you make these changes? (15 Marks)
- **Q3.** Imagine yourself to be a Supreme Court judge sitting on a 15-judge bench constituted to examine the constitutionality of the death penalty.
  - (a) Would you use the doctrine of proportionality for purposes of rights adjudication? Why or why not? (10 Marks)
  - (b) Respond to only **one** of the two questions below: (10 Marks)

Assume that you decide to use the doctrine of proportionality. How would you adjudicate the constitutionality of the death penalty? (You may limit your answer to all the issues relating to the constitutionality of the death penalty as discussed in class).
